A workshop on Braille usage titled "Path to Accessibility and Inclusion through Experiential Learning of Braille" was conducted at Atal Lab, Springdales School, Pusa Road, on 8th May 2025. The session was designed to introduce students to the basics of Braille and promote awareness around accessibility and inclusive communication.

The workshop was led by Dr. Zubeer Ahmed, with Professor Raju Keshari, Professor Poiringthanliu, and Apoorva Roy (from the student body Saksham) serving as resource persons. Apoorva Roy assisted students at their desks, addressing doubts and helping them engage with the Braille learning exercises.

The session covered the Braille alphabet and foundational concepts, enabling students to familiarize themselves with tactile reading and writing. The focus remained on hands-on engagement, allowing participants to understand the system through direct experience.

The workshop provided an introductory but meaningful step towards building sensitivity about accessibility tools and the everyday challenges faced by persons with visual impairments. It emphasized the importance of inclusive practices within educational spaces.

The event concluded with informal reflections by students and teachers, who appreciated the opportunity to learn about Braille in an interactive format.

The Centre for the Study of Disability Inclusion (CSDI), under the aegis of the IQAC, organized an educational visit to the Noida Deaf Society (NDS) on 4th April 2025. The objective of this visit was to provide participants with firsthand exposure to deaf culture and gain insights into the educational and vocational training programs available for deaf students and individuals with disabilities.

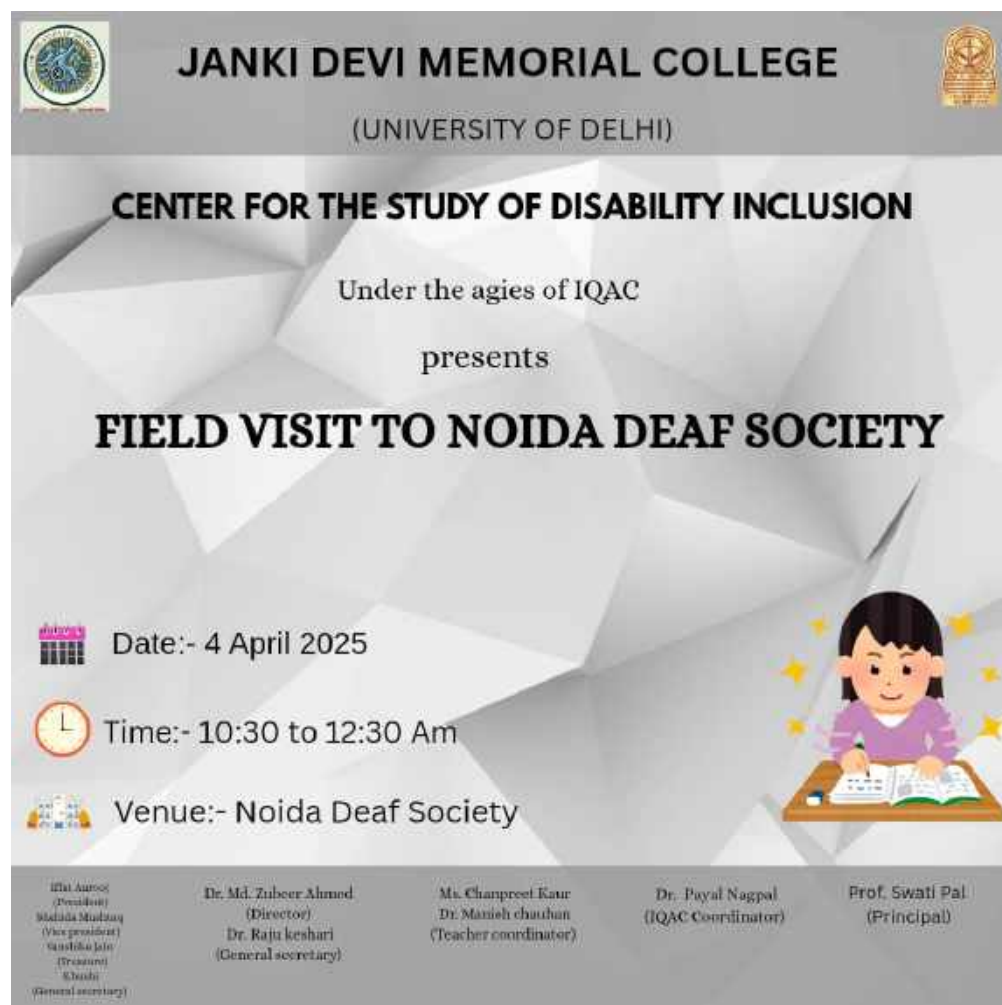
Students were introduced to NDS's visual learning methods, flexible NIOS curriculum, and short-term vocational training courses in areas such as sign language, basic English, data entry, hospitality, bakery, and Photoshop. The institution also supports learners through shelter facilities and ensures high placement rates across sectors like retail, hospitality, and government education.

Notably, students who had previously completed the Foundations of Indian Sign Language Add-on Course engaged with Hard of Hearing students at NDS, communicating in Indian Sign Language (ISL) and gaining practical interaction experience.

Beyond academics and skills training, NDS actively fosters deaf cultural identity through programmes, cultural celebrations, sports events, and community exposure activities. There is a deliberate focus on life skills training—including how to conduct oneself in workplace settings, follow office protocols, and engage in professional communication.

The visit offered a comprehensive understanding of how inclusive educational models can bridge the gap between disability and opportunity. It also highlighted the importance of lifelong learning, employability, and cultural affirmation in building equitable futures for the deaf and disabled communities.

The event titled "Producing a Disability Effect in New Bollywood: Politics, Precarity, and Preoccupations" was held at Janki Devi Memorial College, University of Delhi, under the aegis of the IQAC. Organized by the Centre for the Study of Disability Inclusion (CSDI), the lecture featured Dr. Priyam Sinha as the distinguished speaker. Dr. Sinha, a Humboldt Research Award recipient, holds a PhD from the National University of Singapore and specializes in media industry studies, disability, gender, affect, and production culture.

The session began with a warm welcome, acknowledging the continuous support of Principal Professor Swati Pal, who, due to prior commitments, could not attend but sent her best wishes.

In her lecture, Dr. Sinha explored the evolving landscape of Bollywood, often referred to as "New Bollywood," and its engagement with disability narratives. She highlighted Bollywood's

global influence, contributing over 80% of India's film revenue and shaping perceptions worldwide. She referenced journalist Anupama Chopra's 2019 question about Bollywood's diversification, noting that today's filmmakers are shifting from the traditional song-and-dance formula to more nuanced storytelling that reflects the realities of India's middle class.

Dr. Sinha delved into the concept of "Body Genres and Affect," comparing disability representation with genres like horror, pornography, and action, which elicit visceral reactions from the audience. She critiqued the persistent portrayal of persons with disabilities (PwDs) as helpless or abandoned, citing films like *Khamoshi*, *Paa*, and *Zero*. She emphasized the struggles faced by screenwriters in bringing authentic disability narratives to the screen, sharing how *Taare Zameen Par* took seven years to gain recognition before becoming an Aamir Khan production.

The lecture also addressed the problematic reliance on star power to bring credibility to such narratives, with non-disabled actors often cast in disabled roles. Dr. Sinha referenced Rani Mukherjee in *Black* and Saif Ali Khan's "Langda Tyagi" in *Omkara*, underscoring how such portrayals localize disability experiences but rarely integrate PwDs into production processes. She further discussed the feminization of labor in media production and questioned whether Indian cinema genuinely integrates PwDs behind the scenes. Films like *Margarita with a Straw* by Shonali Bose were acknowledged as rare examples of authentic storytelling centered on disability.

The session concluded with an engaging Q&A, where participants reflected on the importance of scripting, fair contracts, and crediting writers, alongside the need to break away from stereotypical narratives. Dr. Sinha's thought-provoking insights sparked meaningful discussions on production culture and the global-local (glocal) dynamics of Bollywood's portrayal of disability.

The event ended with a heartfelt vote of thanks by Khushi, the General Secretary of CSDI, who expressed gratitude to Dr. Priyam Sinha for sharing her expertise, as well as to Dr. Md. Zubeer Ahmed, Dr. Raju Keshari, and the entire Saksham Student Body for organizing the session. Special acknowledgment was given to Principal Professor Swati Pal and Dr. Payal Nagpal for their constant support.

Overall, the lecture shed light on Bollywood's complex relationship with disability narratives and called for more inclusive practices, both on-screen and behind the scenes. The session was an eye-opener, encouraging students and faculty to reflect critically on representation and advocate for greater inclusivity in the Indian film industry.

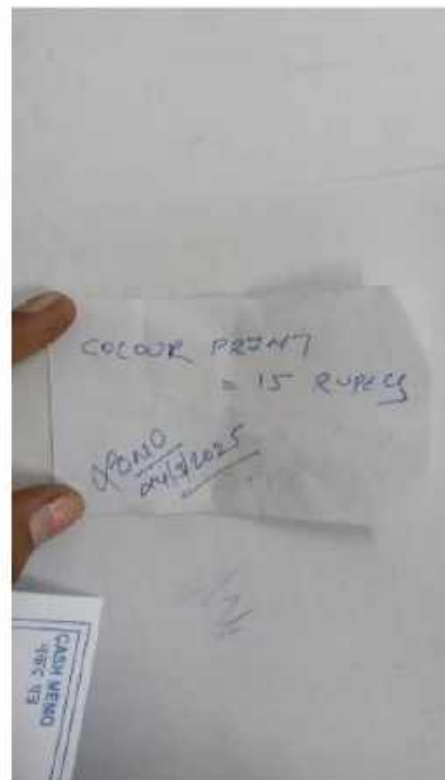

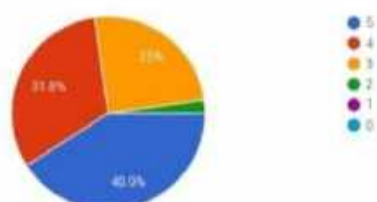

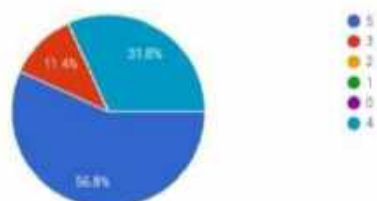

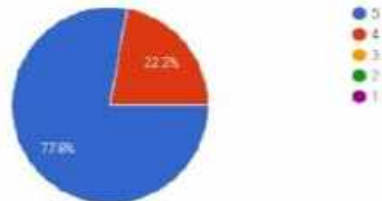

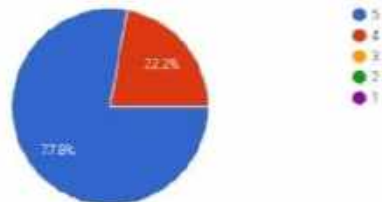

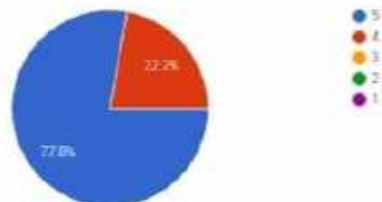

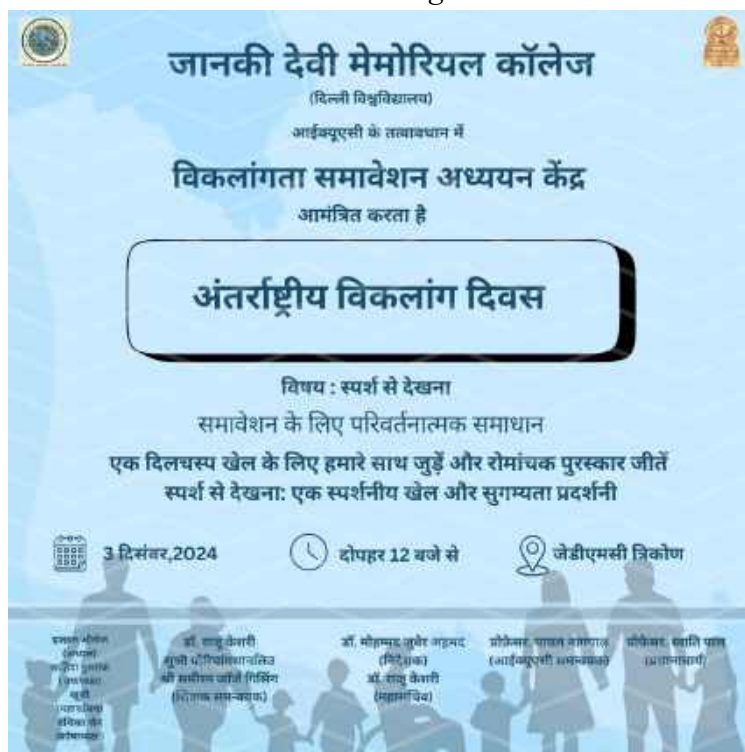

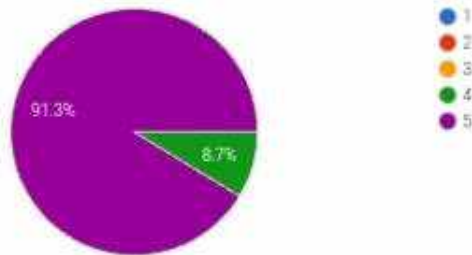

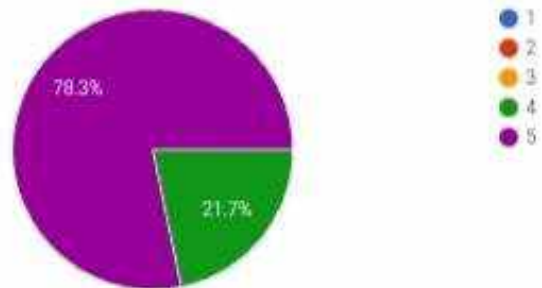

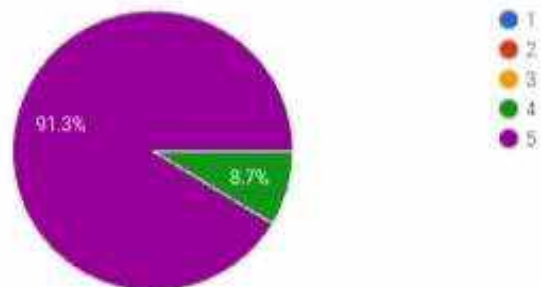

REPORT

Centre for the Study of Disability Inclusion (CSDI), Janki Devi Memorial College (JDMC), University Of Delhi organised a two-day Young Scholars' National Conference on 18th-19th April 2024 on the theme - Dis/Ability : Identity, Representations and Inclusion. The power packed conference started with a welcome address by Prof. Swati Pal, Principal, Janki Devi Memorial College in which she emphasized how the seminar's insights would directly benefit students, reflecting the event's focus on fostering empathy, challenging stereotypes, and promoting inclusivity in education and society. followed by an enlightening Inaugural and Key note by Dr. B.R. Alamelu, Centre for English Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University.

Dr. Alamelu's keynote on "A Call for Renaissance in Disability Discourse" was a testament to her expertise and passion for inclusive narratives. She eloquently highlighted the urgent need for a renewed approach to disability discourse, urging participants to embrace inclusivity and empowerment as the pillars of a more equitable society. Her insightful address set the stage for engaging discussions and inspired attendees to rethink prevailing attitudes towards disabilities. The seminar then proceeded with six enthralling sessions covering all the major aspects of Dis/Ability : Identity, Representations and Inclusion across two days.

There were thirty-four paper presentations by scholars and researchers hailing from various parts of the country covering a diverse set of important issues across the globe. The entire seminar was attended by a good number of participants who graced the occasion by their active participation and positive feedback. The seminar reached its climax with a crucial panel discussion on **"Dis/Ability : Identity, Representations and Inclusion"**, graced by esteemed chairs for

various sessions Mr. Shivam Sharma, Assistant Professor, Department of History, JDMC, University of Delhi, Dr. Kush Kumar Gayasen, Assistant Professor, Department of Political Science, JDMC, University of Delhi . Dr. Md. Zubeer Ahmed, Associate Professor, Department of Political Science, JDMC, University of Delhi and Director, CSDI, JDMC, University of Delhi. Dr. Khachungla Chahang, Associate Professor, JDMC, University of Delhi and Treasurer, CSDI, JDMC, University of Delhi. This was followed by a brief introduction of the Keynote Speaker, Dr. B.R. Alamelu, Centre for English Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, by moderator, Janki Devi Memorial College, University of Delhi).

After this, Prof. Alamelu addressed the audience and began on "A Call for Renaissance in Disability Discourse" during the conference was a compelling journey into the complexities and possibilities of redefining how society perceives and engages with disability.

Nuanced Difference between Disability and Ability: Dr. Alamelu initiated her address by unraveling the nuanced difference between disability and ability, challenging the conventional binary view. She emphasized that disability is not solely a medical condition but a socio-cultural construct shaped by societal norms and perceptions. This foundational insight set the stage for a deeper exploration of inclusive narratives.

Merits and Demerits in Societal Perceptions: Delving into societal perceptions, Prof. Alamelu discussed the inherent merits and demerits embedded within prevailing attitudes towards disabilities. She highlighted the potential for societal attitudes to either empower individuals with disabilities or perpetuate stigmatization and exclusion. This critical analysis underscored the need for inclusive policies and cultural shifts.

Social Context and Evolving Abilities: A key highlight of Dr. Alamelu's address was her examination of disability discourse within diverse social contexts. She emphasized that disability experiences are shaped by intersecting factors such as culture, environment, and socio-economic status. Her insights illuminated the evolving nature of abilities and the imperative for inclusive environments that value diverse contributions.

Optimistic Training and Empowerment Strategies: Dr. Alamelu's advocacy for optimistic training strategies resonated strongly with attendees. She emphasized the transformative power of positive reinforcement, mentorship, and skills development programs in fostering self-

confidence, resilience, and agency among individuals with disabilities. Her call for inclusive educational practices received widespread acclaim.

Complexities of Labels and Identity: In addressing the complexities of labels within the disability framework, Dr. Alamelu urged a shift from limiting categorizations to embracing diverse identities. She presented alternative models of disability that celebrate diversity and individual autonomy, challenging traditional narratives of deficit and dependency. Her nuanced approach encouraged attendees to rethink their perceptions and language use.

Holistic Approaches to Physical Disabilities: Turning attention to physical disabilities, Dr. Alamelu highlighted the multifaceted experiences and challenges faced by individuals. She advocated for holistic approaches that prioritize accessibility, inclusive design, and support services. Her emphasis on creating environments that empower individuals with physical disabilities to lead fulfilling lives resonated deeply.

Impact and Reflections: Dr. Alamelu's comprehensive exploration of these themes sparked meaningful conversations and reflections among attendees. Participants left the session with a renewed commitment to fostering inclusive communities and advocating for policy changes that promote equity and access. Her address served as a catalyst for transformative action and collective empowerment.

Session 1: 18th April 2025 time (11:00-12:30 PM)

Title: Disability and Discourse

Chair: Mr. Shivam Sharma, Assistant Professor at JDMC, University of Delhi

The session began with a welcome note by the moderator Ira Chaturvedi, Student of Janki Devi Memorial College (University of Delhi), followed by a brief introduction of the Chair.

The first paper was presented by Devika T R on the topic "The Uncomfortable Joke: Disability Humour as Sub-cultural Resistance in Indian Stand-up Comedy." Devika's discourse explored the historical misrepresentation of disability across various realms like literature, cinema, religion, and culture. She emphasized the role of Indian stand-up comedy as a form of subcultural resistance, challenging societal norms through comedic expression.

The second paper was presented by Suchandra Bhaduri on the topic "Categorizing Disability in Colonial India (1880s-1947)." She discussed how disability was categorized during colonial rule

through the lens of social and economic utility, perpetuating stigma and marginalization. Suchandra shed light on how colonial policies shaped the identities of people with disabilities, often leading to social isolation and exclusion.

The third paper was presented by Rohit Kasaundha on the topic "From Seclusion to Inclusion: Cinematic Representation of Parental and Familial Voices of Persons with Disabilities," examined the portrayal of familial relationships in cinema concerning individuals with disabilities. Rohit analyzed films such as "The Theory of Everything" and "Taare Zameen Par," highlighting the complex dynamics and advocating for greater diversity and inclusion in filmmaking.

The fourth paper was presented by Tirtah Pratim Deb on the topic "Deafness and Education in Colonial India," focusing on the role of early nationalists and educators in bringing disability into the colonial public sphere. Tirtah emphasized the importance of oralism in the education and social integration of deaf individuals, challenging colonial perceptions and advocating for a more equitable society.

The chair provided feedback at the end of the session, appreciating the depth and insight provided by all presenters. They acknowledged the importance of each paper's contribution to the field of disability studies, emphasizing their elaborative experiences and scholarly rigor.

Their paper on "Inclusivity in Islam: Empowering Disability Narratives" promotes positive narratives and supportive frameworks for disability in Islam. It challenges stereotypes, highlights rights and contributions, and advocates for inclusivity and respect towards individuals with disabilities in the Muslim community.

The session began with a welcome note by moderator Niharika, Student of Janki Devi Memorial College (University of Delhi) followed by a brief introduction of the Chairperson. The chairperson gave an insight about Navigating Disability and its forms.

The first paper was presented by Anoushka Priyam on the topic “Approaching the abject and giving yourself grace: Non-visible disability and the importance of self-narrative in David Foster Wallace’s *The Depressed Person*”. Her paper explores the challenges of non-visible disabilities (NVDs) using David Foster Wallace's "The Depressed Person" as a focal point. It emphasizes the importance of self-affirming narratives in understanding and navigating the complexities of NVDs, advocating for personalized approaches in disability discourse.

The second paper was presented by Swikriti Sanyal on the topic “Subjective Suffering and Illness Identity: Depressed ‘I’ as an Intersectional Identity in Elizabeth Wurtzel’s *Prozac Nation* and Meri Nana-Ama Danquah’s *Willow Weep for Me*”. Her paper explores the subjective experiences of depression in Elizabeth Wurtzel's "Prozac Nation" and Meri Nana-Ama Danquah's "Willow Weep for Me," emphasizing the complexities of illness identity and intersectional perspectives in understanding and navigating depression.

The third paper was presented by Rashida Muneer Chalilakath on the topic “The Glass Child’s Disability by Association: A Study on Jodi Picoult’s *Handle with Care*”. Her paper delves into the dynamics of families with a disabled child, focusing on the experiences of the able-bodied daughter, "Amelia," in Jodi Picoult's "Handle with Care." It examines the concept of the "glass

Through qualitative methods and insights from disability scholars, the study aims to promote inclusivity and understanding in societal discourses about disability.

The fifth paper was presented by Aakshi Srivastava on the topic "Deciphering Mental Disability in Asylums: Studying Sylvia Plath's Tulips". Her presentation delves into mental disability within asylums, using Sylvia Plath's poem "Tulips" as a focal point. The research explores historical challenges in disability studies and emphasizes the need for sensitivity and differentiation in understanding mental health within the context of disability. It discusses the objectification and sense of incarceration experienced by individuals in mental care settings, drawing insights from Ben-Mosche's analysis.

After each presentation, the chairperson gave his constructive feedback on all the five papers emphasizing positive aspects. The chairperson congratulated the presenters, appreciated their effort to raise awareness about disability, and noted personal learning experiences, particularly regarding depression and mental health. A suggestion was made to ensure presentations are concise and focused.

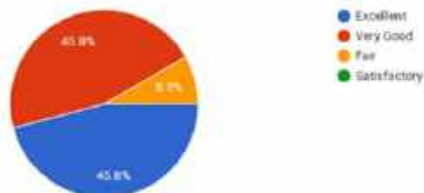
